

2020 Adopted Budget

The Board of Commissioners adopted the 2020 operating budget at its December 9, 2019 meeting. The 2020 budget for the general and sewer funds totaled \$48,011,000 and \$4,728,181, respectively. A modest 1.5% real estate tax increase was adopted, along with no change to the sewer rate and an \$18.00 per year increase to the trash and recycling fee, which now stands at \$245.00 per year. For property owners with an estimated median assessment of \$145,000, the budget increase equated to an annual increase in Township real state tax of \$19 per year. For property owners with an estimated average assessment of \$175,000, the annual increase amounted to approximately \$22 per year.

The saturated recycling market continues to be a challenge for every municipality. Still, Haverford is committed to recycling! While we had hoped the recycling market would stabilize to our benefit, we have to reconcile ourselves with its continued state and the nearly 100% increase in per ton recycling charges levied against us.



All local indicators, as well as, the nation-wide narrative lead to the same conclusion that the recycling environment will remain "as is" for the foreseeable future.

2020 will be an ambitious and exciting year for capital projects in Haverford! The capital projects fund budget of \$19,263,255 includes funding for new hybrid and electric vehicles, continued work on the Pennsy Trail, over \$1.8m in park improvement projects, over \$500,000 in planned improvements at the Skatium, additional road resurfacing, over \$100,000 in improvements planned for our historic structures and capital improvements for the Library and Brookline sites. The staff is excited to see these plans through to completion and hope residents enjoy the improvements made throughout our Township.




## Billboards in Haverford Update

In 2009, a petition was filed with the Haverford Township Zoning Hearing Board by Bartkowski Investment Group (BIG), challenging the validity of the Township's sign regulations with respect to billboards. The petitioner asked the Zoning Hearing Board to find wheather the ordinance improperly excluded the use and proposed to develop non-accessory advertising signs at four sites: 600 and 658 Lancaster Ave., and 1157 and 2040 West Chester Pike. The drawings filed with the petition proposed a billboard and support structure 48 feet long and 17 feet tall, with an overall height of 52 feet and an advertising surface (48' x 14') with 672 square feet. In 2012 Haverford Township Zoning Hearing Board rejected the billboards proposed.

BIG appealed the 2012 decision of the Zoning Hearing Board to Delaware County Common Pleas Court, where the Township's decision was upheld. The company then further appealed to the Commonwealth Court, which reversed the county court, and remanded the case back to Delaware County.

This December, BIG proposed signs smaller in scale, approximately 500-square-feet and 47 feet high. In January, the case returned to Delaware County Common Pleas Court for consideration before Judge Spiro E. Angelos. In anticipation, our elected officials organized two community information sessions to advise residents on the proposals and upcoming court proceedings. Judge Angelos continued the case until February 20, 2020 so at the time of this writing, no ruling has been made. We will keep the public informed via our website and social media once the Court has made a determination.

Fences, walls and retaining walls may **<u>NOT</u>**:

•be constructed or replaced without a permit

•exceed six feet in height

•be placed in a front yard or extend into the right-of-way

•be constructed with the "finished side" facing in

•create a hazard to traffic or pedestrians

•have barbed wire, spikes or other dangerous features

•interfere with access by the Fire Department

Building permit applications must include the following:

•A diagram of the property indicating the location of the fence. If the property is a corner lot, measurements from the center of each road must be provided on the diagram.

•A description of the proposed fence including:

~ fence height from the ground to the highest portion of fence

~ type of fence (ex. chain link, split rail, stockade, etc.)

~ fence visibility (ex. spaced picket with 2" boards and 1" space) or indication that the fence is solid. If the fence includes a solid and open portion, please indicate the height of each (ex. 4' solid with 2' alternating board.) ~ linear feet of total proposed fence

Please contact the Zoning Office for further instructions and additional regulations for fencing corner lots.



We would like to congratulate Chief John F. Viola for completing 50 years of service with the Haverford Township Police Department. Chief Viola was hired as a Patrolman on January 16, 1970. He also serves as Chief of the Brookline Fire Company. Thank You for your service to the community!

With the spring sports season approaching, parking and traffic near our playgrounds and ballfields will increase. Please drive carefully and park ~page 6~ your vehicle in a responsible manner. Parking within 30 feet of a stop sign and within 20 feet of an intersection are violations of state laws. We also see an increase in vehicle's blocking driveways and parking on lawns. These violations decrease driver's field of view and increase the chances of motor vehicle accidents. Please be a courteous driver.

Please be aware of suspicious calls, emails and texts you may recieve. In recent weeks, we have reports of residents being victimized by scam artists using these methods to commit their crimes. Always be leery if the form of payment is electronic/gift cards/ Wire Transfer. Visit www.havtwp.org/ Police\_Department/Press\_Releases\_and\_Police\_Notices.html or contact police if you suspect you are a victim of a phone scam.

Officers from the Department were given Life Saving Commendations for actions they took that helped save 2 lives.

On Thursday, September 12, 2019 police and medics were dispatched to the YMCA. Officer Kenny arrived on scene and was led to the victim in cardiac arrest on the gymnasium floor, after playing basketball with his 13-yearold son. Officers immediately began chest compressions and recognized the need to utilize an AED. After shocking, officers continued CPR, switching off when necessary, until the arrival of Narberth Ambulance personnel. Sergeant Reynolds, Officer Fuller and Officer Kenny took direct, immediate and positive action to preserve the life of another human being who was clearly in danger of dying.

Then, only 4 days later, on Monday, September 16, 2019, police were dispatched to Citizens Bank, 160 West Eagle Road, for a report of a subject down. Officers Fuller, McCreight and Viola arrived on scene and found the victim was in cardiac arrest. Officers immediately began chest compressions and recognized the need to utilize the AED. Sergeant Reynolds, Officer Fuller, Officer Kenny, Officer McCreight and Officer Viola instinctively acted in a heroic manner and provided lifesaving treatment at the most critical stage. These Officers are a credit to themselves, Haverford Township and the Haverford Township Police Department. For their actions, they were awarded an official Commendation for a Life Saving Event.

Great job by all the Officers involved!

The Board of Commissioners established an anti-discrimination policy (Ordinance 2626, Chapter 183) in February of 2011. The Ordinance prohibits discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations (such as restaurants, stores, and banks) on the basis of race, color, religious creed, ancestry, age, sex, national origin, disability, use of guide or support animals because of blindness, deafness or physical disability of the user or because the user is a handler or trainer of support or guide animals. It also covers a person's actual or perceived sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression.

The Human Relations Commission (HRC) – comprised of seven community members charged with hearing complaints alleging violations of the Ordinance – ensures that all members of Haverford Township enjoy equality and equal protection under the Ordinance. It achieves this through education, community outreach, and mediation of complaints. The HRC is non-partisan and non-profit, and there is no charge for its services.


