Preface

The Township of Haverford Police Department is a community oriented police department whose philosophic tenants are rooted in a proactive policing approach that works in partnership with the community. The goal of this partnership is to deliver the highest level of police service possible to Haverford Township, its residents, businesses and the citizens of our larger community. This annual report is a reflection of our efforts to openly communicate with these stakeholders.

A review of the 2015 Crime statistics for the Police Department revealed a 5% increase in total crimes reported with a decrease in burglaries of 27% from the previous year. The department issued summary citations for 4,622 violations of the crimes and vehicle codes in 2015. The department's officers also issued 2,869 written warnings for violations of the vehicle code. Through the use of the "Operation Safe Streets" campaign, which focuses on quality of life and traffic issues, along with "Operation Keep Safe", which focuses on a reduction of nuisance crimes, officers strive to address those crimes which directly impact our residents. These programs form the foundation of Chief Carmen Pettine's and the Police Department's commitment to reduce crime in our community.

Chief Pettine continued through 2015 to push for the department to move forward into the 21st century, by enhancing the department's ability to utilize effective crime reduction strategies. This goal will be achieved by providing officers with the best available equipment, training and programs that enable them to provide a level of service and protection that the residents of Haverford Township have come to rely on.



Mission Statement

The mission of the Haverford Township Police Department is to improve the quality of life throughout the Township by providing a secure community environment through the delivery of police services in an efficient and effective manner.

We, the Haverford Township Police Department, are dedicated to protecting all persons, and fostering a positive relationship of cooperation and understanding between the Police Department and the citizens of Haverford Township.

We shall strive to establish a climate of mutual respect and trust through positive interaction with citizens of the community and by maintaining a community oriented policing philosophy.

Commissioner D'Emilio was the Commissioner appointed to the Police Committee for 2015. He was involved in ensuring that the police department was provided the opportunity to deliver quality service to the members of this community

This is the eighth edition of the Haverford Township Police Department Annual Report. This report was created under the direction of Chief Carmen D. Pettine and Chief John F. Viola. The information was compiled by the officers of the Police Department's Community Policing Unit.



Departmental Organization and Staffing

The Department has three divisions and a total complement of one hundred and fifty sworn and civilian personnel.

The Township of Haverford Board of Commissioners established a Night Watch and Police Force June 5, 1916. When Ordinance number 77 of 1916 passed, it did “ordain” the Night Watch and Police Force would consist of one Chief of Police and not more than nine Policemen, one of whom may be appointed Sergeant of Police.

Our Departmental history shows the first Chief, Edward F. Hallisey, and the five officers initially hired did not have long lived or prosperous careers. The Chief left the Department after only three years and ten months of service. His first recruits fared far worse. The first officer hired by the Township, George T. Neeli lasted ten days and the second officer hired completed four months. This four month stint was three months longer than any of his fellow hires. Ordinance number 77 also outlined the officers’ duties. “Policemen shall patrol their respective beats during all of the time they are on duty and shall be governed in making arrests of all drunken, disorderly and suspicious persons by the laws of this Commonwealth, and by the Ordinances and

Regulations of the Township. It shall also be the duty of Policemen to inspect the street lights maintained by the Township and to immediately report any lights not in good order and further to inspect all poles, lines and overhead wires and all streets and roads containing water, gas or other pipe-lines and to immediately report any defects therein or dangerous condition caused thereby,..."

Today our Department consists of one Chief of Police, sixty nine sworn officers and seventy eight civilian personnel. The civilian personnel consist of three information assistants, one administrative assistant, one records office manager, two secretaries, one part time records clerk, one Animal Warden, one evidence custodian, one full-time parking enforcement officer, four part time parking enforcement officers and sixty-one crossing guards. Of the sixty nine officers one is a Deputy Chief, three are Lieutenants, twelve are Sergeants and fifty-three are Police Officers. Over the last thirty-nine years this Department has hired 120 officers. All of those hires have either retired or remain actively employed by the department with the exception of twenty-six officers. Those officers served an average of 7 ½ years with the longest serving officer completing 18 years of service. Twelve of the officers left the department to work for other Law Enforcement agencies.



In the last one hundred years not only has officer retention drastically improved but the education and certification the officers possess is unprecedented in our department history. In 2015 our sixty nine officers completed seven thousand seven hundred and ninety hours of police education.

The department has had twelve Chiefs and three hundred and sixty six officers. Carmen D. Pettine is the twelfth Chief of Police for Haverford Township. Chief Pettine has a strong belief in community based policing and continues to move our department forward from the Night Watch mentality of the first eighty years of our history to the proactive, partnership based community policing model of today.

In January of 2015 the department saw the retirement of Patrolman Mark Mouraviev. Patrolman Mouraviev served the department honorably for twenty five years. His last assignment was as an officer in the patrol division. Patrolman Mouraviev was also a member of the Motorcycle Unit and served on the department's Special Response Team. The men and women of the police department

wish Mark well in retirement, his dedication to the job and to his fellow officers will be missed.



January also saw Officer Kyle Cutcliff leave the department for an opportunity to serve as a police officer in his neighboring hometown of Springfield Township. While Officer Cutcliff was only with the department for just over three years his personality and hard work did not go unnoticed and brought him praise amongst his fellow officers. Our loss as a department will be Springfield's gain, good luck Kyle.

This year also saw the retirement of two long time civilian employees, Barbara Vito and John Roberts. Both Barbara and John became full time civilian police employees when they were hired as dispatchers. When the department transitioned to the Delaware County Communications Center for dispatching both Barbara and John remained and transitioned from Dispatchers to the Information Assistant role in the department. Barbara Vito served the Department for 23 years and John Roberts for 22 years. Their service was greatly appreciated and we wish them well in retirement.



Remembering Our Own

In our ninety nine year history one officer has made the ultimate sacrifice.

This is the Police Department's ninety-ninth year since our inception. During that time we have seen officers come and go, retire and unfortunately even pass away. Only one officer however, in our history, has been killed while in the performance of his duties. On November 10, 1967 Norman D. Barr, Badge # 74 was assisting a disabled motorist on Darby Road in the Llanerch section of the Township. While helping that disabled motorist Patrolman Barr was struck by another vehicle passing the scene becoming pinned under that vehicle and was killed. Patrolman Norman D. Barr made the ultimate sacrifice while serving Haverford Township. In remembrance of his sacrifice Norman D. Barr's name appears on the wall at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C. for law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. The current police department building was dedicated to Patrolman Barr on September 26, 1993.



Officer of the Year

2015

The department in 2011 began to honor one of its members. This honor was designated as the “Officer of the Year.” The award recognizes outstanding individual performance from an officer that exhibits a commitment to their profession and exceptional achievement over the previous year. Candidates for Officer of the Year are nominated by the supervisors of the police department. Then the supervisors through a majority vote select one candidate as the department’s Officer of the Year.



The 2015 Officer of the Year Award was given to Officer Joseph McGibney, its fifth recipient. In presenting the award in May of 2015, Chief of Police Carmen Pettine noted that this award was a result of nominations from within the Department to recognize one of their own as the “Officer of the Year.”

At the Haverford Township Commissioners meeting and in front of members of the community and several of his fellow officers, Chief Pettine presented the Officer of the Year Award to Police Officer Joseph McGibney. Chief Pettine, in his remarks during the presentation, commented that this award is to acknowledge “outstanding service to Haverford Township” by one of its police officers. The chief in his comments also noted that the award is presented to an officer that has demonstrated “diligent and faithful duty and for valuable and extraordinary service performed consistently over the entire year.”

Officer Joseph McGibney joined the Haverford Police Department in 2009 and is currently assigned to the Patrol Division. Before coming to the police department Officer McGibney was in the United States Army from 2000 to 2008 where he served two tours of duty in Iraq. He then began his civilian service with the University of Pennsylvania as a Police Officer. Since joining the Haverford Township Police Department Officer McGibney has shown his versatility as a police officer acting as an informal leader within his squad and someone who is willing to help out in any way necessary.

In presenting the award, Chief Pettine noted that Officer McGibney’s supervisors described him as “an active and self-motivated police officer. He brings a positive attitude to work every day.” Officer McGibney’s exceptional work and dedication

to duty are exemplified by the fact he has been nominated for this award two years in a row.

In the past year Officer McGibney responded to a medical emergency. The medical emergency turned out to be the drowning of a twenty-two month old child. Upon arrival officer McGibney ran into the back yard where he found the child's mother performing CPR on her lifeless baby. Officer McGibney relieved the distraught mother and provided CPR to the child until Emergency Medical Services personnel arrived and took over. As a result of Officer McGibney's action the child was successfully resuscitated, survived the incident and has been doing well since that day.

For his exceptional police work, dedication to duty, leadership and professionalism Officer Joseph McGibney is the Haverford Township Police Department's "Officer of the Year."

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is the backbone of the Haverford Township Police Department. It is tasked with carrying out the basic functions of the police department. While every member of the department is sworn to protect life and property, prevent crime, and arrest violators of the law, it is the members of the patrol division that help to accomplish these goals through routine patrol of geographical areas, responding to emergency and non emergency calls for service, investigating traffic collisions, enforcing the motor vehicle laws, and handling other requests for police services. The patrol division is on duty twenty four hours a day, seven days a week and is staffed by two Lieutenants, nine Sergeants, forty seven police officers and four police K9s.

A manpower distribution plan is used by the Department. The plan utilizes multiple districts along with overlapping sectors. This plan allows the officer assigned to a district to maximize their time in the assigned district. This is accomplished by assigning the sector officer to the back-up role rather than bringing another district officer out of his district to back a fellow district officer.



The plan allows the Department to keep the officers who patrol a district familiar with the people and issues occurring in that district. An Officer is generally assigned to the same district or sector for an extended period of time so they become familiar with the activity in the area. The approach fosters a better working relationship between the community and the officers that can lead to an ownership mentality around the unique issues in their area.

The department also continued its commitment to the community through its participation in the Delaware County Heroin Task Force under the direction of District Attorney John J. Whelan. A major component of the task force is the

Naloxone program. Naloxone is a drug that can reverse the effects of an opiate overdose and bring an unresponsive person back to life. The Haverford Township Police Department was one of the first Pennsylvania police departments to train its officers in the use of nasal naloxone and place the drug into its police vehicles for use by officers in responding to overdose situations. In 2015 the police department responded to nine opiod overdose situations and administered naloxone. As a result of the timely actions by police officers seven of those opiod overdose victims were saved.

The Haverford Police Department Sub-Station continued to be a location for residents and the police to interact within the community. The sub-station is located in the Manoa Shopping center. The sub-station is utilized as an office area for Street Patrol Officers to use during routine patrol of the shopping center. The availability of this space allows for officers to have an opportunity to have contact with residents who are conducting business in the shopping center and also provided an opportunity for

the business owners to address any concerns or safety issues to officers. Residents are reminded that the sub-station is not always manned and to call 911 to request assistance or report any crimes in progress. There is a direct 911 line to the Delaware County Communications Dispatch center located on the wall next to the main doors. The Community Policing Unit will hold several scheduled events at the sub-station in 2016, which will be advertised on the Township website.

Special Events



This past year the department once again handled three large community events; Haverford Township Day, Haverford Music Festival and Haverford Spring Fest. All three events have become annual community events in Haverford Township.

Over the past few years the department has increased its efficiency for planning and executing large scale community events. From the first Haverford Township Day twenty one years ago, through the US Open at Merion in 2013 and the newer additions of the Haverford Music Festival and Haverford Spring Fest the department, working with the community and event organizers, has developed strategies to handle large crowds while maintaining an open and welcoming atmosphere.

In 2015 these events required the department to provide traffic control for large sections of the center of the township that had to be closed to all vehicle traffic for the combined better part of three days. Due to the location of these events much of the traffic control required officers to man traffic control posts. In addition to having to reroute all the vehicle traffic the officers are also charged with providing for pedestrian safety while the community arrives at and departs from the event sites.

This past year the smallest of these events, Haverford Spring Fest, brought approximately 10,000 patrons onto the unit block of Brookline Blvd and into the surrounding area. Once inside an event the men and women of the department had to provide physical security for the event patrons. They also coordinated emergency and medical responses and routinely completed essential tasks like reuniting children with their lost parents all the while striving to maintain a safe and community friendly environment.

These three community events required the department to utilize a combined 82 officers over approximately 845 combined man-hours to set-up, facilitate, take down and then return the affected area back to normal. The department has to complete these events each year while still maintaining and fulfilling its normal duties throughout the rest of the township as these large scale events are underway. This task is only able to be accomplished through the dedication and professionalism of the men and women of the Haverford Township Police Department.



K9 Unit

The **K9 Unit** is supervised by the Patrol Division Watch Commanders. The K9 Unit is comprised of four K9 Teams. Officer Mark Semerad & his K9 partner Kato, Officer Doug Linker & his K9 partner Jango, Officer John Valvardi & his K9 partner K9 Barr and Officer Thomas McDermott and his K9 partner Axel.



In 2015 the department had to retirement K9 Jagër early due to a medical condition. K9 Jagër's medical condition of "lumbosacral instability and bulging of the lumbosacral disk" made it impossible for him to continue his service. K9 Jagër will be greatly missed by the department; however he found his forever home with his partner Officer Gill and his wife. Jagër is now reaping the rewards of a civilian pet. The retirement of K9 Jagër created an opening in the K9 Unit and Officer Thomas McDermott was selected to become the next K9 handler. K9 Axel, a two year old Belgian Malinois was purchased from Shallow Creek Kennels located in Sharon PA. HTPD received \$7,000 in donations for the continuation and advancement of our K9 program from: Videon Dodge -\$5,000, Boyle Oil - \$1,000 and Commissioner D'Emilio constituents - \$1,000.

Officer McDermott and his new partner K9 Axel completed the grueling six week K9 Handler course at Shallow Creek Kennels and graduated the course on Friday November 13th 2015. On Thursday November 19th at 1900 hours, Officer McDermott and K9 AXEL conducted a narcotics sniff inside the house at 140 West Hillcrest Avenue. In short time AXEL found hidden drugs in 4 different locations in the residence. The hidden drugs (cocaine and marijuana) were located in two separate 2nd floor bedrooms and in a 3rd floor attic crawl space. As a result of this find, detectives continued the search and recovered assorted drug paraphernalia used in the sale of drugs, along with 2 handguns, 3 rifles, assorted gun ammunition, handcuffs, and **\$73,459.00 in cash.**

The K9 Teams conduct monthly maintenance training which is indicated in the chart below. Officer John Valvardi is the lead trainer for the K9 Unit. The K9 Teams were able to utilize the former Stratford Friends School located at Llandillo & Darby Roads for most of their training. The HTPD K9 Unit has also been provided with the opportunity to work with and utilize the facilities of PennVet Working Dog Center in Philadelphia. This working relationship has provided many successful hours of training for our dogs and handlers. The hard work and diligence by our officers is evident in the success of the K9's in real-time incidents handled on a daily basis.

K9 Unit Notable Incidents

The K9 Unit has become a valuable asset to the complement of officers and equipment we use to serve the citizens of Haverford Township. 2015 proved to be a very productive year for the K9 teams. Some of the more notable incidents that they were involved in were:

K9 Barr

- Located a 99 yr old female with dementia who walked away from her home. Missing for approximately 45 minutes in wet rainy conditions.
- Three positive finds on vehicles searches
- 14 tracks of persons
- 11 Narcotic searches
- 1 article search

K9 Jango

- Narcotic search in the 800 block of Valley Rd. that resulted in an arrest for possession of illegal drugs including marijuana and cocaine.
- Track of a subject who fled police in the 900 block of Township Line Rd. The track resulted in locating the homeless subject and an area where he had been sleeping in the woods.

- Successful track of a subject who was involved in a incident at 2050 Old West Chester Pike where he was threatening employees with a knife
- 6 Narcotic finds during vehicle searches
- 10 Building/residence searches.

K9 Kato

- At the request of PA State Troopers from the Eastern Drug Interdiction Unit, K9 Kato conducted a narcotics sniff of an envelope containing \$9000.00 in U.S. currency which had been seized during a Drug Interdiction stop of a subject at the Philadelphia Airport. Kato gave a positive indication for narcotics associated with the currency.
- Deployed for a search of an 11 yr. old boy who was missing from a home located in the 800 block of Aubrey Avenue for approximately 1 hour . Kato completed a successful track and the boy was located uninjured.
- Kato conducted several vehicle searches with successful alerts.

Special Operations Unit

The Special Operations Unit (SOU) is responsible for many facets in the overall operation of the Police Department. The Unit is staffed by 1 Sergeant and 7 Officers and allows the Department flexibility in deploying officers of the unit for special events, conducting training or other administrative functions without depleting the resources of the regular patrol unit.

One of the primary responsibilities of the SOU is fatal (and near fatal) crash investigations, crashes involving police cars, hit-and-run crashes or any other extraordinary crash. Specialized equipment used in those investigations includes the Leica FlexLine TS02plus Manual Total Station measuring and diagramming device, the Laser Technology's LTI 200 laser measuring device and the CAD



Zone's CrashZone diagramming software. All members of the Unit have completed the basic fatal crash investigation classes, and at least one advanced crash investigation class. Two members of the unit are certified as Accident Reconstruction experts.

In an attempt to prevent crashes, members of the Unit utilize the three E's - Engineering, Education and Enforcement. The engineering facet consists of conducting traffic surveys and making recommendations concerning traffic patterns and restrictions, i.e., traffic calming. The education facet finds Unit members attending community meetings and listening to their concerns, offering a variety of solutions and

working with the Township to complete the task. The enforcement facet is the extremely focused solution to crash prevention. By issuing a citation, the goal of the police officer is to prevent the reoccurrence of a potentially dangerous behavior. The Department participated in two specialized programs, Buckle-Up PA and Aggressive Driving, which received both federal and state funding. The primary focus of the Buckle-Up PA program is seatbelt usage, and encompasses both education and enforcement portions of the program. The Aggressive Driving program is targeted toward aggressive driving behaviors, and is strictly an enforcement program. During these programs, contact was made with drivers, and officers issued 147 traffic citations through the Buckle-Up PA program and 183 traffic citations through the Aggressive Driving program.

The Department is responsible for coordinating the Northern Delaware County DUI Taskforce, which is comprised of six area municipalities. The Task Force was responsible for conducting DUI Check Points and the training of officers concerning DUI related issues. In 2015, the Taskforce conducted five DUI Checkpoints and five Roving DUI Patrol events.

Officers assigned to the SOU also conduct firearms training for the Police Department, as well as other training required by the State and Department. We conducted over 1,120 officer-hours of firearms training and qualification in 2015. Our Officers also attended over 7,790 hours of instruction outside of the Department in various disciplines related to their responsibilities.

Additional duties of the SOU include the maintaining of certifications, repairing or facilitating the repair of equipment, from VASCAR units to flashlights, and the disposition of seized registrations and driver's licenses. In 2015, the department seized and sent 256 documents back to PennDOT. The unit also investigated 206 abandoned vehicles and processed for disposal 98 of them. The Unit also conducted 13 traffic studies for volume and speed. The officers of the SOU are responsible for specialized traffic enforcement e.g., commercial motor vehicles, car seat checks and installation, as well as acting as the department's Quartermaster.

School Crossing Guards

The coordination and supervision of the school crossing guards is under the direction of the Sergeant of the Special Operations Division. There were sixty three men and women employed as crossing guards in 2015, these guards are responsible for all of the school crossings within the Township. The department always welcomes residents to submit applicants for this position. This can be done by contacting the secretary of the Crossing Guard/Meter Enforcement Office at 610-853-1298 ext. 1261.

Training for the crossing guards is conducted by the Special Operations Unit officers. This training is conducted on the first day of school, and serves as a refresher for the guards as to their responsibilities in crossing the school aged children and pedestrians. An end-of-year meeting and appreciation luncheon was held in June 2015 to thank the guards for their service

Parking Enforcement



The Parking Enforcement Office is under the direction of the Sergeant of the Special Operations Division and is responsible for all of the parking meter enforcement. The office is staffed by one secretary and five parking enforcement officers.

Throughout the township are 390 parking spaces. These spaces are controlled by meters located within five different municipal parking lots and curbside parking spaces at several different business districts. Central meters control the Brookline and Oakmont municipal parking lots. These central meters are solar powered and will assist the Township in “going green” by reducing the electric costs to run the meters. The meters are maintained and serviced by Parking Enforcement Officers, who are also responsible for the coin collection from these meters.

During 2015 the Police Department continued our parking enforcement efforts within the “Safe Streets” campaign in an effort to improve public safety and enhance the quality of life within the community. The increased enforcement initiative was part of an effort to encourage voluntary compliance with parking regulations and address citizen’s complaints of parking violations throughout the township. The Police Department achieved these parking compliance goals in a multiphase approach. The first step was to focus on resident and motorist education promoting voluntary compliance, secondarily focusing the efforts of our patrol officers on the parking campaign and the third stage was continuing to utilize our Parking Enforcement officers through expanded responsibilities that include the enforcement of violations upon residential streets and roadways along with meter time violations and Fire Marshal Zone parking violations.

The meters throughout the Township can be paid by using coins or the Parking Card. This offers a convenient way for drivers to utilize meters without having to carry or search for coins. The Parking Card will also allow the driver to retrieve any unused time on the meter back on the card. Parking Cards can be purchased at the Haverford Township Police Department, Records Division.

There were a total of 3,042 parking tickets issued in 2015. Parking Enforcement Officers issued 1,203 of those parking tickets. Collections from meters totaled \$108,713.93. This amount was a decrease from the 2014 amount of \$135,638.14. The police department municipal parking lot sticker sales totaled \$16,078.00 which was a decrease from the 2014 amount of \$19,378.00. Fines collected for parking violations totaled \$41,774.00 in 2015, which was a decrease from \$51,562 in 2013. There were 572 state citations issued for un-paid Township parking violations.

Police Motorcycles



An additional responsibility of Lt Michael Glenn is the coordination of the police department motorcycle officers and events. The motorcycles are utilized in various aspects of police work however they are primarily used for traffic enforcement and routine patrol. The department also provides police motorcycle escorts and traffic control for visiting

dignitaries, large funerals, parades and special events. Haverford Police Department Motorcycle Officers once again participated with the Philadelphia Police Department and various agencies in the annual delivery of Thanksgiving, Easter and Christmas

dinners to families of fallen officers throughout the Philadelphia, Montgomery, Delaware and Bucks county area.

Each year officers assigned to ride a department motorcycle attend a Police Motorcycle Operators re-certification course. This course is an intensive 3-day motorcycle police officers training course, focusing on ten practical exercises that stress low-speed maneuverability, evasion techniques, and high-speed braking skills. Students spend the entire course "in the saddle." They are given practical exercises and riding instruction supplemented with demonstrations of tactical techniques.



This intensive program develops the coordination, skills and confidence necessary for officers to operate a police motorcycle safely and efficiently. The training provides the police officers with the confidence and skills required to ensure their safety and to utilize the motorcycle to enhance public safety. Officers who successfully complete the course receive a certificate of completion. Haverford Township is fortunate to have Lieutenant Glenn certified as an instructor. He is certified through Northwestern University and Harley-Davidson as a Basic Police Motorcycle Operator Instructor. Lt. Glenn has instructed approximately 124 hours of training for officers from our department along with officers from neighboring communities in 2015.

Critical Incident Team (CIT)

The Critical Incident Team is a specialized group of highly trained officers that are utilized by this department to respond to the most dangerous and critical incidents in the township and surrounding jurisdictions when requested. These officers are divided among two teams; the Special Response Team and the Crisis Negotiation Team.



Special Response Team



The Special Response Team is the department's tactical team. The officers that comprise the Special Response Team are all highly trained and motivated officers who are tasked with resolving critical incidents through the use of specialized weapons and tactics. The police department is able to utilize four current officers as certified instructors in various police sciences pertaining to tactical operations. Lieutenant Joseph Hagan, Sergeant Craig Scott and Officer Lawrence Howard are certified NRA firearms instructors. Officer Michael Flynn is an

internationally recognized instructor in Tactical Team Development receiving his certification from Heckler & Koch International Training Division. Officers Brian Coleman and Steven Lane are certified breaching, Active Shooter and MACTAC instructors. Detective Stephen Laughlin and Officer Lawrence Howard are chemical munitions and less lethal instructors. Officers Nicholas Nawn and John Coxhead are certified Arrest and Control and Defensive Tactics instructors. These certifications allow the department to develop and provide high quality in-house training to enhance and expand the Special Response Team's capabilities. These trainings are coordinated through the Special Operations Sergeant and Lt Hagan.

This year the Special Response Team as a group received over 2484 hours of specialized training. The training consisted of practice in basic tactical movement, firearms, less than lethal weapons, and specialized tools including hazmat suits, distraction devices and deployment of chemical agents.

All members of the Haverford Township Special Response Team are required to pass a Basic Swat Class and then successfully complete individual training with the team before they are considered for appointment to the team to be an active tactical operator.

In addition to the teams normal training this past year the team participated in the third Delaware County SWAT Challenge. The SWAT Challenge is a competitive training day where the county's five dedicated Special Response / SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) teams use their skills in multiple events including building clearing, officer rescue, pistol and rifle shooting, precision marksmanship and individual and team obstacle courses. At the end of the day for the second time in three years the Haverford Township Police Department's Special Response Team was the overall winner, taking home the District Attorney's Cup. The Cup was presented to the Team by District Attorney John J. Whelan.

The Haverford Township Police Department also houses the "Bear Cat" tactical response vehicle for Delaware County. This specialty vehicle is available for use by all

of Delaware County's tactical teams. When the "Bear Cat" is requested, a driver and safety officer from the Haverford Township Special Response Team respond with the vehicle. In 2015 the "Bear Cat" was called into service 16 times and the Haverford Township Special Response Team Officers assigned help to resolve each of those incidents.

Crisis Negotiation Team

The police department also maintains a Crisis Negotiation Team. The Crisis Negotiation Team is responsible for resolving critical incidents through the use of specialized negotiation tactics. The team is coordinated by Sergeant Shant Bedrossian.

In 2015, three officers were added to the Crisis Negotiation Team bringing its compliment to six negotiators. All the members of the Crisis Negotiation Team have received training from the Federal Bureau of Investigations along with the Law Enforcement Officers Training School in basic crisis negotiations. Several of the team members have also received training in Advanced Negotiations and Specialized Negotiations from the Federal Bureau of Investigations and the Law Enforcement Officers Training School.

The Crisis Negotiation Team regularly attends the Federal Bureau of Investigations conference on negotiations held in Baltimore County Maryland, and attends presentations held by the Delaware Valley Negotiators Associations. These events cover the newest techniques and trends in resolving critical incidents. The team also conducts regular in-house and scenario based training, to enhance readiness of the team.

The Animal Warden

The office of the Animal Warden is a civilian position within the police department that is responsible for all animal complaints within Haverford Township. The animal warden reports to the Patrol Commander for platoons 1 & 2.

This past year the animal warden continued to be a valuable asset to both the police department and the community in general. The addition of the animal warden to the police department has strengthened the communication between police officers and the animal warden. This enhanced communication has resulted in fewer animal calls being handled by police officers and getting routed to the animal warden who can better resolve those calls for the residents of the township. This more appropriate use of department resources freed patrol officers to handle more specific police related matters. Below is listed the number of calls or types of animals the animal warden received complaints about.

The Animal Warden's office is located in the Township Police Department Records Office. The Animal Warden may be reached at 610-853 1298 Ext. 2205. The Animal Warden's regular duty hours are from 9:00 AM to 2:30 PM Monday to Friday.

Detective Division

The Detective Division is commanded by one Lieutenant who is responsible for three symbiotic units; the Criminal Investigations Unit, the Narcotics / Vice Unit and the Juvenile/ Community Policing Unit as well as supervising the Evidence custodian. The Detective Division Lieutenant is also the Commander of the Crisis Negotiation Team. The Detective Division is under the command of Lieutenant Charles Moore.

Criminal Investigations Unit

The Criminal Investigations Unit was comprised of Detective Sergeant Daniel Wallower, Detective Sergeant Christopher Chambers, Detective Mark Johnson, Detective Matthew Hufnal, Detective Thomas Long, Detective Stephen Laughlin and Detective Michael Kenny in 2015. The Detective Division conducts follow up investigations on all major crimes occurring in Haverford Township as well as investigations into other suspicious incidents or criminal activities. The unit also assists other Local, State and Federal Law Enforcement Agencies in ongoing investigations.

This year the Criminal Investigations Unit conducted investigations into five hundred and thirty one cases. Those investigations led to one hundred and forty adult arrests, eleven juvenile arrests. During 2015 detectives received results from DNA evidence that was submitted for testing. That evidence led to the identification and arrest of an adult for a Burglary from an incident in December of 2014. Detectives also submitted fingerprint evidence to AFIS (the Automated Fingerprint Identification System) and that submission led to the identification and arrest of another adult for a Burglary of a home in 2015.

Incidents of note in 2015 included the Robbery of the Verizon Wireless Phone Store on West Chester Pike. While on patrol Officer Todd Howe observed a vehicle matching the description of the suspects involved in the robbery. As a result of that vehicle stop further investigation led to the identification and arrest of two suspects. These suspects were also responsible for the robberies of three other Verizon Wireless stores in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. As a result of the multi-state jurisdiction the

Federal Bureau of Investigation took over this case and ultimately brought federal charges in these cases.

Also in 2015 threats were posted through social media online to do harm to the “Best Buddies” group within the Haverford High School. “Best Buddies” is a social and support group that brings physically or developmentally disabled students together with volunteers from the general student body. This investigation led detectives to obtain and execute search warrants that resulted in the identification and ultimate arrest of an adult offender for terroristic threats and related offenses.

The Criminal Investigations Unit also conducted one hundred and sixty background investigations for other governmental agencies, such as the Armed Forces, Federal, State or local Government. One hundred and fifty six Township residents were fingerprinted by the Unit as a service for part of their pre-employment requirements for employment with Federal Agencies, Child Care, Teachers, Law School, and Securities Exchange etc.

During the year the Unit’s activities included service of various court instruments Search Warrants, Consent Searches, Court Orders and Subpoenas to obtain or locate Weapons, Recordings, Phone Records, Bank Records and evidence in Burglary, Robbery Fraud, Theft and Drug Related Crimes. The service of these instruments resulted in arrests and the recovery of property, drugs and firearms.

Narcotics / Vice Unit

In 2015 the Haverford Township Police Departments Narcotics/Vice Unit continued its successful mission of combating drug use and sales within Haverford Township and throughout Delaware County. The unit consists of one (1) Detective Sergeant, one (1) Detective and two (2)



Patrol Officers. The Chief of Police has charged the unit with the duty of investigating and enforcement of narcotics and drug violations as well as helping to deal with quality of life issues throughout the township. The members of the unit are also assigned to Delaware County’s Drug Task Force.

The Narcotics/Vice Unit conducted numerous investigations into drug based crimes which resulted in nineteen (19) felony arrests, twenty-four (24)

misdemeanor arrests, ten (10) arrests on warrant and seven (7) bench warrants for a total of sixty (60) drug/narcotic related arrests for the year 2015. As a result of these arrests the unit seized three (3) vehicles and \$77,602.46 in United States currency.

The Unit also conducted eight (8) search warrants and fifteen (15) searches upon consent. The Department forwarded the money and vehicles to the Delaware County District Attorney's Office for forfeiture proceedings. The above arrests



were for the following violations: 16 - for marijuana, 11 - for cocaine, 12 - for heroin, 8 - for prescription pills, 1 - for MDMA/Ecstasy, 2 - for methamphetamine and 1- for steroids.

Drug Trends

Marijuana, cocaine and heroin will continue to be the drugs that are prevalent and



available in Haverford Township and Delaware County due to the close proximity of Philadelphia, New York and New Jersey. Prescription drug abuse continues to be a problem in our area and has reached epidemic status nationwide. Heroin use will continue to increase as high availability and low prices encourage an increasing group of prescription opioid abusers to transition to heroin.

Community Policing & Juvenile Investigations Unit

In 2015 the Haverford Township Police Department Community Policing Unit and the Juvenile Investigator are responsible for the majority of the education and investigation of juvenile matters. The unit is under the Detective Division Commander Lt Moore. The Unit is staffed by Police Officer Michael Flynn. Detective Sergeant Daniel Wallower oversees and assists with Juvenile Investigations as a secondary assignment.

The community policing mission is to provide information to the public so it can be informed of current crime trends and have a basic understanding of how to reduce their risk of victimization.

Officer Flynn is a Certified Crime Prevention Specialist and is tasked with instructing citizens of the township, adults and school aged children, in methods and strategies to reduce victimization. Crime prevention officers work closely with the residential, commercial and industrial communities to develop strategies that promote proactive community problem solving and crime prevention.

The foundation of a successful community policing strategy is the close, interactive relationship between officers and community members working toward the goal of reducing crime and its effects. Efforts focus on the underlying causes of crime by assessing the characteristics of problems in specific neighborhoods and the application of appropriate, mutually supported problem-solving remedies in a partnership role.



Crime prevention officers work closely with all community groups such as Local Civic Associations, Optimist Clubs, Rotary Club, Church groups, Boys and Girl Scout troops and neighborhood organizations with Community based safety presentations and programs. Additionally the unit is responsible for presenting a

wide range of safety and education programs to students in the Haverford Township School District and Parochial Schools.

The Juvenile Unit is tasked with investigating criminal activity that substantially involves juveniles as either suspects or victims. During 2015, 43 juveniles were petitioned to Juvenile Court with charges including Robbery, aggravated and simple assault, theft, weapons violations and drug violations.



An additional responsibility of the Juvenile Unit is overseeing the referral of juveniles to the Youth Aid Panel program. This program is designed to divert first time juvenile offenders away from the formal juvenile court system. The program is applicable to any first time offender who has committed a relatively minor offense such as a curfew violation, retail theft, underage drinking, disorderly conduct etc. This past year 121 different offenders were reviewed for our diversionary programs. The office reviewed 90 juvenile cases for eligibility in the Youth Aid Panel and there were 31 background investigations conducted by the Juvenile Detective for eligibility in the County Task Force diversionary program. Those background checks led to 9 findings of ineligibility for the applicants.

In 2015 Officer Michael Flynn was recognized for his work with juveniles and the Youth Aid Panel program both in Haverford Township and in support of the Center for Resolutions center in Media, PA. The Center for Resolutions at their annual dinner presented Officer Flynn with the 2015 Alan D. Moss award “In recognition of your ongoing support to the youth of Delaware County”.

The Community Policing Unit continued to educate the public in 2015 by conducting safety and awareness classes for local groups. One such talk was given to the parents of students at the Haverford Middle School. The educational program provided the group with information about cyber safety, sexting and other new laws that affect both them and their children in the digital environment. Officers also highlighted the need to always be conscious of their personal safety and how to report crime to the police department. The Officers of the CPU continued the effort to reduce underage drinking and dangerous behavior by conducting park checks and saturation patrol of problem

areas throughout the township. The CPU Officers conducted fifteen (17) Law Enforcement Details over the grant period. These details targeted known areas for underage and problematic drinking. The department also conducted sixty (60) elementary school classes through our R.E.A.C.H. program that targets the concerns of alcohol abuse, underage and problematic drinking. These classes were given in the parochial elementary schools within the township. These classes included 15 one hour classes at each school with approximately 25 students per class. This accounted for 1500 total student contacts last year. The Department also created and distributed underage and problematic drinking pamphlets in conjunction with this grant throughout the community.

The department utilized geographical mapping and a review of departmental records to determine problematic areas and behaviors. A review of statistical data found officers actions resulted in 70 underage drinking arrests. Officers also found a secondary problematic behavior, public drunkenness, that resulted in 70 arrests for that violation. These concerns about underage and problematic drinking were further supported by the number of medical emergencies from alcohol overdoses, twenty-eight (28), within the community. As a result of the increased efforts of the department to combat underage and dangerous drinking in public areas we have noticed a decrease in the behavior in those public areas. This effort was funded by a grant received from the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board.


Staff Services Division


The Records Unit

In 2015 the Records Unit provided information from over 19,362 police events to persons requesting information. The unit processed over 3042 parking tickets and there were 1303 alarm activations. Below is a list of revenue generated through police services.

The Court Coordinator



The Court Coordinator is a full time civilian position within the police department. The Court Coordinator is a liaison between the police department and the courts of the Commonwealth. The Court Coordinator is responsible for coordinating officers' schedules with the court calendar to maintain efficient administration of justice while working to reduce costs to the department. The Court Coordinator interacts with the three District Courts that serve Haverford Township along with the Court of Common Pleas in Media, PA on a daily basis. Keith Hall has served as the Departments Court Coordinator for 16 years since 2000 when the department instituted the Court Coordinator Program.

In 2015 the Court Coordinator facilitated the prosecution of 418 felony or misdemeanor criminal cases at the three district courts. The Court Coordinator also coordinated 427 summary criminal cases and 4,214 summary traffic cases at the District Courts. Mr. Hall also ensured the officers of this department were available for all criminal trials and summary appeals at the Common Pleas Courts including over 150 "On-Call" cases. Mr. Hall also coordinated the transfer of 90 DUI blood samples to the appropriate Laboratories for chemical testing so the officers could effectively prosecute their cases.

2015 Statistical Reporting

The following section is a compilation and review of the crimes, reports, citations, calls for service, training, and related statistical information for 2015. Several reports also make a comparison between 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 statistics. The data to compile this section was obtained through the in house Metro Alert records management system, our training files, Police Department Unit Commanders and the Pennsylvania State Police Uniform Crime Reporting System. This information is the best and most accurate information available to complete the report. However as with all systems of information there may be minor discrepancies due to different record keeping procedures.


The statistical information is separated into three sub-sections. Sub-Section A contains statistical data for the year 2015. The department continues to track activities that all of our police officers engage in everyday that do not cause them to generate a police report. These miscellaneous activities may be actions similar to providing someone with directions, directing them to additional government resources for assistance, investigative background checks, traffic posts or business checks. While these activities do not result in a criminal arrest they are a vital component of police service to our community and their importance is reflected in the number of occurrences. The first graph of Sub-Section A depicts this newer category. Sub-Section B contains a multi-year comparison of statistical data over the years 2015, 2014, 2013 and 2012 and Sub-Section C contains Police Education for 2015.



All Crimes 2015









Juvenile Arrests 2015





Haverford Township Police Non-Criminal Incidents 2015










Total Police Reports By Day Four Year Comparison














